#### CASUALTIES WERE NOT GREAT

Intervention by the United States is Being Discussed on All Sides

Havana, Sept. 9.-Government, milttary and railroad officials and the inewspaper correspondents were thrown Into a state of excitement this evening men who arrived here from Paso Real with stories that the armored train which left Havana Friday had met with various obstacles beyond Herradura, had been thrown from the tracks and its 300 men, machine guns. orses and equipment captured. As these tales were confirmed by the Western railroad's first telegraphic advices from Paso Real, they were believed to be true until authentic reports of actual occurrences were wired by those who had returned to Paso

Real from the scene. The real facts of the case are that Col. Avalos, who was believed to be surrounded in Pinar del Rio City, and the armored train made a junction east of Concolacion del Sur, and the government forces to that extent are imd. The news of this fact caused relief in official circles. proved.

The train proceeded Saturday ovening from Paso Real to two and a third miles east of Consolation del Sur, at which point the rails had been removed, and replaced a locomotive and three cars which had been thrown from the track. The insurgents attacked, but were driven off by the two machine guns handled by the Ameri-

can, Capt. Webster. It is believed that many insurgents were killed, but the number is not were killed, but the number is not known. Meanwhile a large portion of Col. Avalos' force had come eastward from Pinar del Rio for the purpose of making a junction with the machine gun corps. At Consolacion del Sur their advance was disputed by a large band of insurgents, and a lively fight ensued. The insurgents and a vere driven off and sev-eral of them were killed or wounded. Avalos and his men continued their journey eastward this morning and made a junction first with the cavalry force of Capt. Ravenna, which is scoutng ahead, and finally with the disabled troop train. The train has not been lested since the junction was effected, but the bridge over the Santa Clara river castward from the train was own up today, together with two smaller ones, preventing the use of the road beyond Herradura.

## CAPTURED IN THE VERY ACT.

Saloonkeeper Shot and Mortally Wounded-Strike-Breaker's Revolver Falls and Shoots a Man.

San Francisco, Sept. 9.-Two Fillmore street electric cars were held up and the conductors robbed of their collections at Fillmore and Francisco streets about 11 o'clock last night. The highwayman, Harry W. Merton, a discharged United railroads employe,

was surprised and captured by the police while holding up the second car. Merton boarded the first car and at the point of a revolver compelled Conductor E. H. Williams to turn over his collections, the robber stating that he wanted only the company's money. He then dropped off the car and stopped another one going in the opposite di-rection, and was in the act of robbing Conductor Albert J. Davis when the car was surrounded by Corporal of Pe-lice Morrissey and Officers Hogan and

Sheble, who had been informed of what was transpiring by Conductor Wil-liams of the first car, two blocks from the scene. Merton made a break to escape, but surrendered when he saw that the police had the drop on him.

Six dollars and 10 cents was found in his possession and was booked as evidence at the Bush street police station, where he was charged with robbery. Frank Duenckho, a saloonkeeper, was shot and mortally wounded by three

men who attempted to hold up his saloon at Eddy and Devisadero streets shortly before 12 o'clock last night. Duenckho resisted and was shot through the breast. Attracted by the shoo inst the police arrived on the scene in th to capture the trio. They gave their names as Charles J. Blake, Frank O'Connor and Charles Collignon, and are said to be strike breakers imported by the United railroads during the re-

cent strike. Duenckho was taken to the Central emergency hospital, where it is said that he will die.

While walking along Fillmore street last night Louis Spalo. a waiter, en-countered a crowd said to be strike breakers. Just as he passed one of the revolvers carried by one of the men slipped from the fellow's pocket, struck the pavement, was discharged and sent a bullet into Spalo's head.

Immediately on the discharge of the weapon the men scattered in all directions, leaving Spalo unconscious on the street. Passersby summoned the po-ice patrol and he was taken to the imergency hospital. His wound may rove fatal.

#### THREE MEN LOSE THEIR LIVES IN ABANDONED WELL

Butte, Mont., Sept. 9.-Three ranch men lost their lives late this afternoon by being overcome by gas in an aban-doned well on the flats below the city. DEAD.

Frank Ely, aged 51. Matthew Fogarty, aged 34. Andrew Mehar, aged 35. Fogarty and Mehar both lost their lives in attempts at rescue. Ely had started down the well with the inten-tion of cleaning it when he was over tion of cleaning it, when he was over-come, falling to the bottom, a distance of 34 feet. When he felt himself going, Ely yelled, and Fogarty at once re-sponded to Ely's cry for help, but he, too was soon component when he fell too, was soon overcome, when he fell to the bottom. Mehar, unaware of the presence of gas, attempted to descend to the rescue of his two friends, and had gotten down but a few rungs of the ladder when he also fell to the bottom of the well.

All the bodies were recovered after several hours' work, grappling hooks being necessary to bring the remains to the surface.

SPECIAL RELIEF TRAIN.

New York, Sept. 10.-A cable dis-patch to the Herald from Havana

The special relief train of armored cars left Havana at 11 o'clock Sunday night for Consolation del Sur. Col. Clews said:

"The best advices received are that Pino Guerra was driven east from Con. We are going as far as we can get on the western railroad and expect to get the rebels between the batteries of the two trains. As there are no details here it is difficult to tell exactly what we will do until we reach the scene. I take 180 men and four machine guns."

Capt. Abbott, who started in charge of the batteries, said:

"We will take plenty of water and provisions for 10 days, and have made all arrangements to avoid the difficulties that can be forescen."

There are rumors on every side about the insurgents plan to capture the city. The story generally credited is that Col. Ashert will bring his men into Vedado, while Guerra goes around by way of Guanabacoa."

#### HIGH PRAISE FOR STOLYPIN.

Moscow, Sept. 9.- In the course of an nterview today, Alexander Gutchkoff, the Octoberist leader, gave his approv-al to the general tone of the ministerial declarations, adding that the courtmartials are a cruel necessity when a virtual state of war exists in at least a part of the county. M. Gutchkon compared the conditions existing in Russia with those at San Francisco after the recent earthquake there when looters were killed without even the formality of a trial. He said the pillaging here was on a similar basis, having ceased to be revolutionary and become mere ruffianism. "I must say." said M. Gutchkoff, "that I have the greatest confidence in Premier Stoly-pin. There never was such a capable and talented man in power in Russia. 1 believe in the honesty of his inten-tions and hope he will be able to exe-
