## The Prosecution Opens.

The hearing of the charge against Dr. C. J. Weatherly and Earl D. Gray of using the U. S. mails with intent to defraud came up in Commissioner Pratt's court this afternoon. Attorney Morse defended Weatherly and Judge McDonald appeared on behalf of the other defendants. The first witness was John J. Thompson, attorney for the Amalgamated Association. HEBREW REBELLION.

A Change of Their Rule. Creutz & Son.

New York, Aug. 2.—A radical departure in regard to the Abrahamic rite was made by the recent central conference of the Hebrew robes in this city, but it came as a surprise to many throughout the Jewish world. The resolution of the conference declared the acceptance of the rite by practice of the Hebrew religion to be a religious and a civil recognition, and a movement is already on foot to express the sentiments of the conservative element of the religion in the same manner as in former days.
