

DOINGS OF THE COUNCIL.

The Business Men's Association's Plea for the Los Angeles Franchise.

NEW CITY JAIL RIDS SQUARE.

City Offices Must Be Open Eight Hours a Day.—The Dry Earth Ordinance.

The City Council met in a jumbled session last night. In the absence of President Leesmore, Councilman Rich was called to the chair. The members present were: Pollard, Kirkpatrick, Hardy, Hays, Wathland, Lowman, Hays, Evans, Moran, Beswick, Kelly, Bell.

President Leesmore came in at 9 o'clock, and Mr. Rich vacated his chair in his favor.

The Proceedings.—Philip Puglisi asked for a remission of sidewalk tax. Board of public works.

The committee on improvements recommended that an electric light be placed at the intersection of Eighth South and Fifth West streets. Adopted.

SOUTH STREET ALLEY.—The committee on streets recommended that the estimate for walks at \$10 cents per foot not be passed on Second South street until the recorder instructed to publish notice of intention to cover the work. Adopted.

COMMERCIAL STREET ALLEY.—G. F. Culmer and others sent in a communication calling attention to the condition of the alley ways leading through and from the block on either side of Commercial street, and asked the city engineer to establish the grade so that the board of public works might contract for and have them cut down to the established grade provided by law. Board of public works.

UNTIL AUGUST NEXT.—The Harmon estate asked that they be allowed to postpone construction of their sidewalk on Second South street until August next. Board of public works.

THE LOS ANGELES FRANCHISE.—The partition of the Salt Lake & Los Angeles Railway company for a franchise to operate a standard gauge track from Salt Lake City to Los Angeles, west end of the present track on the west side of Sixth West street in the east side of Fifth West street, and to lay a curve from said track into block 31, plat A, was taken up. The company also petitioned for the right to operate a standard gauge track on Fifth West street from South Temple street to a point on Sixth West street just north of the Second South street and to lay a curve at the intersection of Sixth West and South Temple streets, so as to connect with the line on South Temple street.

WHAT ENGINEER DOREMUS SAYS.—

The city engineer, reporting in the matter, said the franchise asked for, though not within the operation of said tracks would be practicable, so far as concerns the petitioners, but it would at the same time cause great inconvenience and danger to residents on the said streets, as the streets are already occupied by other lines.

If arrangements could be made by which the petitioners could use the tracks already laid, he would recommend that the petition be granted to allow them to use "with the tracks in common as much of the center of the street as may be necessary for the purpose, excepting Sunday and legal holidays."

On motion of Moran the words "as am," were substituted for "as is." The resolution thus amended then passed.

The council then adjourned until Tuesday night next at 7 p.m.

GEOGRAPHY M. LARSON.

The Business Men's Association sent the following:

A meeting of the executive committee of the Business Men's Association of Salt Lake City, held on the 22nd instant, resolved that the committee be directed to request your immediate vote to grant the franchise for a right of way now before the City Council, and voted for by the Salt Lake & Los Angeles Railway company. The interests of this railway are inexplicably identified with our city. Apart from the fact that it is a purely local enterprise, it has been decided to require payment of money, and will expend large additional sums, and which in consequence, promises much for Salt Lake, it is therefore requested that the franchise be granted to enable our citizens to take advantage of its existence. In the judgment of this association the railway company asking for nothing that cannot be reasonably granted. As

the cause is well advanced, to refuse or delay in any way the application, however meritorious it may be, during the coming session, will still severely injure the prospects of the enterprise. Therefore, it is requested that you immediately take such action as will insure the immediate and favorable consideration of the Salt Lake and Los Angeles railway petition.

Lawson moved that it be referred to the city engineer and building inspector.

Lost.

Moran moved that further action be deferred until the next week next.

Harty moved that the master be referred back to the committee on prisons with instructions to submit specifications on Tuesday night next.

Carried.

TO HEAD OFF PRESUMPTIVE CRIMINALS.

Whereas, Much of the work done in some of the departments during the past year has been done by contractors, and whereas the various committees without proper authority of this council, and

Whereas the incurring of expenditures on public property is conducive to extravagance on the part of the public and prejudicial to good management of the fiscal affairs of the city, therefore be it resolved that all contracts for public property be let by the city engineer, and that all tenders be rejected as soon as possible after the date of the bidding.
