FINANCIAL CIRCLES **LESS APPREHENSIVE**

Prices Show Some Improvement But No Great Demand For Stocks.

LITTLE PRESSURE TO SELL.

Rumors of Alarming Character Freely Circulated But Had Small Julias once On the Market.

New York, Sept. 1. The feeling of anxiety and apprehension which has been prevalent in financial circles for several weeks past was perceptibly quieter last week, and this was reflected in some improvement of prices. This was accompanied without any very submantial revival of demands for stocks, the buying coming clearly for the most part from the covering of short contracts left open as a conse-quence of bear operations during the prolonged decilining. On the selling side however, there was a marked subsid-ence of the kind of pressure which has

however, there was a marked subsidence of the kind of pressure which has kept the market in disorder during the recent period. The change in seatlment was easily discernible in the disregard of the rumors of an alarming character which were circulated in the early part of the weeks alleged embarrassment by stock and bond houses, and even by influential houses. The bears soon perceived that these devices were ineffectual, and they were led perforce to buy in stocks on a rising scale to cover their short contracts.

Quite the most influential factor in the situation was the announcement by the secretary of the treasury of his latention to make large weekly deposits of government funds with the national banks during the period of the crop advancement demand. The response was prompt, and not only in the American market, but in the great foreign money centers as well, in London especially, the discount rate declining, and it became quickly manifest that defensive measures in that market against New York's supposed intention to draw on foreign money resources were being abandoned. As a matter of fact, the earnest purpose of the present recuperation among some of the great foreign banks was based largely on the solicitude over the short supplies of foodstuff. solicitude over the short supplies of

The treasury measures for supplying our currency needs give promise of a relaxation of demand on foreign money resources for this purpose. There is general agreement, however, that this country's position in the situation is stronger than for several years past at this period of the year. For soe thing, foreign lenders of money have exercised a sharp discrimination against would-be borrowers, so that it is outstanding bills in foreign markets running to maturity are much smaller than usual. The past few months also have seen a very large return of foreign holdings of American securities to the home market. This has been a material factor in addition to the burden of stress, but the floating supply of American securities abroad has been correspondingly reduced and a smaller supply left available for sale to influence the market.

Not all of the early rumors of formation of a bankers' syndicate to bid for the whole issue of New York bonds were confirmed, but the opinion was that the offering would prove a success, and a goodly portion of the issue would be placed with foreign investors. The fact that the rate of interest on the New York issue had been raised to 4½ per cent, compared with the previous 4 per cent rate, lent a clear inference of

per cent, compared with the previous 4 per cent rate, lent a clear inference of a high prevailing rate for capital still a high prevailing rate for capital still existing and led to some readjustment of not only New York city bonds, but of other high grade investments. The prospect that the Issue would be placed, however, indicated the fixing of New York standard and of the breaking of the deadlock which has existed between capital and its employers.

A forcible reminder, on the other hand, of the difficulty which still remains was shown by the decision of Erie to offer script as a dividend instead of regular cash dividend. This determination to conserve cash re-

This determination to conserve cash resources for outlay in required betterments was regarded as so far symptomatic of a general condition as to cause some renewed weakness in stocks of companies known to be similarly situated. Evidence was at hand also of the continued reaction in the iron and copper industries, but reports of the conditions in general mercantile lines showed activity sustained.
