

ing the Republic. A resolution was unanimously adopted pledging all persons present to support the royalist cause in the coming struggle. The principal importance attached to the affair is that it will be possible to cause prosecutions.

Berlin, 5.—A military officer has committed suicide in the Thiergarten here. Monetary difficulties led to the act. Such events occur now almost daily.

Several firms of Bremen have entered into a combination for the purpose of organizing a line of steamers to run from Bremen to Cuba and Porto Rico. Four steamers under the Spanish flag will maintain a regular connection between those places, which will be of great importance to the export trade of Germany.

The police have discovered a secret union of foreign laborers at Hildesheim, Hanover. Several arrests; important papers seized.

The Emperor has accepted the resignation of Gen. Van Kameke as minister of war. Either Gen. Bransart, Van Schaellendorff, or Gen. Capri will succeed him.

Hettlin, 5.—A fire in the Vulcan shipyard at Bredow caused a loss of 7,000,000 marks; insured.

Vienna, 5.—The trial of 30 socialists begins on Thursday. The indictment details the evidence obtained connecting the accused with the internationale, Herr Most. Half are charged with treason, and half with murder or complicity therein. The crimes were committed last summer.

Prague 5.—The trial of Socialists is adjourned, because the preliminary examination resulted in the implication of other persons on charges of high treason.

Madrid, 5.—Another chief of the "Black Hand" society is arrested at Arcos, whose duty it was to visit various towns with copies of the constitution and by-laws of the organization, for the purpose of forming branches. Several landlords in Xeres received letters demanding money.

The Black Hand Society has extended into Estramadura. Judges are investigating the secret societies, and still receive threatening letters.

Bucharest, 5.—A proposal has been introduced in the Chamber of Deputies by 42 members, providing for the expenditure of 100,000,000 lire for the erection of forts made necessary by the political situation. Urgency is voted for the measure.

Algiers, 5.—An expedition of great proportions is being organized to crush the rebels in the southern part of Oran.

Valenciennes, 5.—General Laroche, commander of a cavalry brigade, committed suicide.

Cairo, 5.—Abdel Kadir Pasha arrived at Senaar, after severely defeating the False Prophet, who lost 4,000 men.

MADRID, 6.—The families of many of the imprisoned socialists are receiving funds for their support from mysterious sources.

Hundreds of vine stocks in Xerez have been maliciously destroyed. Persons suspected have been arrested.

London, 6.—Gladstone in the Commons last night said: The surprise of Hartington that the evacuation of Egypt might be completed in six months was merely the expression of a hope founded on circumstances.

Paris, 6.—It is semi-officially announced here that Byrne will be released to-day.

Brussels, 6.—A Brussels student of Liege University, was arrested, with twelve thousand francs, he is believed to be connected with Socialist propaganda.

London, 6.—The sentences passed by the editor, proprietor and printer of the *Free Thinker*, are for hard labor.

Liverpool, 6.—The police of this city seized a number of rifles and bayonets on the premises of a shopkeeper here.

London, 7.—It has been ascertained that there is no foundation whatever for the statement that Parnell intends to resign his seat in Parliament and proceed to America in the event of his land reform bill being rejected.

British imports increased February compared with February of last year by £3,897,000; exports for the same period decreased £645,000.

The bill preventing the shooting of trapped pigeons passed to its second reading in the Commons, 5 to 40.

Capt. O'Shea writes the *Daily News* defending Parnell against Mr. Forster's attack in the Commons. He says immediately after the Phoenix Park murders, Parnell drew up

an address announcing his retirement from political life, and was prevailed upon by his friends only with great difficulty to alter his mind.

At a meeting in behalf of the Scotch crofters in Exeter Hall, Saml. Waddy, M.P. for Edinburgh, condemned the ousting of a diligent population for the convenience of a few English lordlings and American millionaires.

It is rumored Polk Egan left Paris with the Land League securities. The police are tracing him. It is believed he has gone to Spain.

Berlin, 7.—The appointment of Blumenthal as Minister of War was revoked to day.

Bucharest, 7.—The Chambers of Deputies passed a bill providing for the expenditure of 15,000,000 lei for the erection of forts, made necessary by the political situation. The Prime Minister said the sole object of the construction of new forts was to guarantee the neutrality of Roumania.

Geneva, 7.—Trade between Germany and Italy is growing so fast that the St. Gothard Railway is running extra trains. The increase is mostly coal and iron. England hitherto has had a practical monopoly in Italy. Smuggling increases more rapidly than trade. It is conducted by a gang of Swiss and Italians, who, when arrested, pay their fines from the common fund. They are aided in their operations by trained dogs.

St. Petersburg, 7.—The Chinese governor whose intrigues hindered the delineation of the Kuldja frontier, has been dismissed and his successor has been instructed to expedite delineation.

Baden Baden, 7.—It is stated Prince Gortschakoff's illness is due to a recent attempt to poison him. After severe vomiting last week, the doctors discovered traces of phosphorus. The police are making investigation.

Panama, Feb. 24.—The \$50,000 robbery is still unexplained and the seven Americans are yet incarcerated, with apparently no evidence against them.

Guyaquil continues Hannu Vientimilla in authority, who, as his fortunes become more desperate, becomes more tyrannical and adopts measures which are frightening those who yet abhor his colors. On the 11th his little armed cruiser *Huacho* seized the English ship, *Mysterious Star*, lying outside the bar at San Lorenzo, and it is thought that it will lead to serious trouble.

The arrival of Gen. Butterfield and Geo. Crocker in Guatemala City, has marked a new era of work and effort in the construction of the Guatemala Central Railroad. Fitzsimmons, chief engineer, has a large force at work on the extension from Escuintla to the capital, and orders have been given to add 1,500 laborers to the number already employed. Six ships are on their way or have arrived with material. Work on the Central Railroad of Salvador, for which Butterfield holds concessions, will shortly be commenced. Butterfield will visit San Salvador during the present month, and final arrangements for the prosecution of the new railroad in that republic will be made.

Dublin, 7.—At a meeting of the local board for giving food, County Mayo, the treasurer reported that great distress prevails in the district; over thirty persons were in the poor house suffering from famine fever. There were 700 names in the list of persons needing relief. The distress has not been so great since 1847. People who refuse to enter the workhouse are dying from want of food outside.

Berlin, 7.—The Prince of Wales has been created a field marshal of the German Empire.

LONDON, 8.—The *Times* correspondent at St. Petersburg says: A number of important arrests have recently been made at Moscow. The arrests are due to the extra vigilance of the police owing to the near approach of the coronation of the Czar. There is no reason to believe that any special plotting will prevent the coronation.

SEVIER STAKE CONFERENCE.

The Sevier Stake Conference was held here on Saturday and Sunday the 24th and 25th ult. The Saints were addressed by Presidents Spencer and Seegmiller, most of our local Bishops, Presidents of Quorums and others, on matters of organization and record. There was more than a full attendance, and the outside congregation was addressed by Elder Palmer of Glenwood.

President Spencer felt encouraged and a spirit was aroused among the people for good. There was, everywhere, a fuller payment of tithes and offerings, evincing an increase of faith and corresponding happiness among the people.

The Presidency of the Stake had visited the Wards preparatory to a full and complete enrollment and revival of the lists of members of the various quorums of Elders and Lesser Priesthood. A meeting of the High Priests' Quorum was held on the Friday evening previous and such as had been recently ordained added to their number. Some were received as members of the Ward, but not enrolled until they get recommends from the Stakes to which they belong, to avoid being numbered twice.

The General and Local Authorities were presented by the Stake Clerk and sustained without dissent.

A very interesting meeting of the Priesthood was held to-day at which the Juvenile Presidents of the several quorums of the Lesser Priesthood ably represented their constituents and the Elders were comforted and blessed to behold the sight.

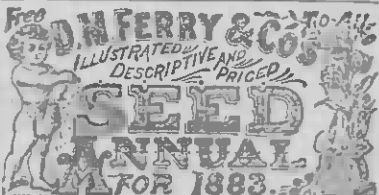
