"As You Like It."

The fact that there was no perceptible diminution in the attendance at the Theatre last night is of itself a striking testimonial of our citizens to the capability of Louis James and Marie Walenwright as artists on the mimic stage. The transition from the deeper shades and more robust passages of "Virginia" to the light and even airy deportment of "Orlando" was certainly antipodal, or nearly so, and yet in either instance the stars were entirely satisfactory to everybody. This shows a range of versatility rarely equalled on the modern stage.

The company is an excellent one; it is not especially weak at any point, and is strong beyond mediocrity throughout. They carry their respective assignments throughout from first to last without "hitching" or other drawbacks, and pay more attention to details than is always the case. In one instance last evening we thought there might have been an improvement; that was in the wrestling scene. Considering that it is an incident in a Shakespearean, not a modern blood-and-thunder drama, a little more attention to the stagecraft would heighten the effect and be entirely within the range of propriety. Otherwise, everything was complete.

Tonight the ever-popular but sadly-neglected "School for Scandal," with Mr. James as "Charles Surface" and Miss Walenwright as "Lady Teazle," will be played. This will be a very old departure, and we doubt not a very enjoyable one.

BREAKERS-AHEAD.

Likelihood of Lively Developments in the Church Cases.

JUDGE ZANE APPEARS FOR THE SCHOOLS.

Led the Whole Amount to Taken for Attorney's Fees, and Incidental Expenses.

Yesterday afternoon, before Judge E. T. Sprague, two more witnesses, Mr. K. H. Harker and C. W. Bennett, testified to the amount of compensation they thought the attorneys for the receiver in the suits for the Church property should have for their services. These witnesses also were of opinion that \$10,000 each, or \$20,000 in all, was not too much. It was admitted, however, that their firm did not receive half that sum in the D. & H. G. cases, where the amount involved reached into the millions.

The "compensation" claims have been so unusually large as to attract general attention. One prominent attorney suggested, "they think they have a fat goose to pluck, and don't mean to leave any pickings." The state of things created considerable interest, especially among members of the bar, and the session of the

TERRITORIAL SUPREME COURT, at which the Examiner's report was expected to be made, was well attended this forenoon. Chief Justice Stanford, and Associate Justices Boreman, Henderson and Judd were present.

District Attorney Rogers arose and stated that he was not now appearing for the government in the case, but for the receiver. He had requested the Attorney General of the United States to send some one to represent the government and that official had designated District Attorney Hobson, of Colorado, but Mr. Hobson had been too busy to come. Mr. Rogers therefore asked a postponement of the date of making the referee's report.

Mr. Young joined in the request for delay for the Church attorneys to look at the receiver's accounts.

At this point Judge Zane arose and asked leave of the Court to appear in the case. The schools of the Territory were interested in the disposal of the Church funds escheated to the government.
