Salary of Chief of Police Increased-Grounds Leased For County Pesthouse.

## TROUBLE OVER GAS FRANCHISE

Wm. Darst Wants Restraining Order Issued Against George A. Snow, et al-Carnegie Library Report.

Ogden, July 17 .- At the meeting of the city council last night, the law committee brought in a favorable report on the ordinance to increase the salary of the chief of police to \$135 a month, and the same was passed, and as soon as signed by the mayor becomes effective.

The buildings and grounds committee rendered a report to the effect that they had visited with Joseph Standford, county commissioner, the site of the city's pesthouse and had also in-vestigated the petitions of the commissioner in which he asked for a lease of a portion of the city's grounds near the mountain for a county pest house and recommended that the commissioners be granted the lease of a piece of ground west of the city's pest house for the erection of such an in-stitution for the county. The recomendation was adopted.

The special committee to which had been referred the bill of F. M. Farrel for repairs on the city's street roller which was recently vetoed by the mayor and correspondingly rejected by the council on the grounds that it was outrageously excessive, reported that the bill be allowed after a reduction of \$\$3.25 had been made.
