The bears made seemingly reckless incursions into prices and dislodged a perfect avalanche of the stocks, prices 421/4 dropping a point or more between sales. 15% The market feil into utter demoralization which continued until after 2:30 o'clock, when the bears began covering 3314 bidding for stocks in the same reckless way in which they had sold and bring-545% ing prices back a point or upward at a jump.

The rush of bears to cover carried the prices of stocks which have suffered more severely up again from 5 to 10 points. The excitement was extreme and continued with furious activity up to the close of the market.

Ten minutes before the close money was loaned at 125 per cent. The relief caused by the declaration

of the banks to do what they could to keep the money rate down, kept the market quiet for a while, and some rallies were made. As the day progressed the urgent needs for money caused a violent advance in the call loan rate on the board. Thirty per cent was paid and at times 50 per cent was bid, fol-436 lowed by a demand for money at 70 per cent. Stocks gave way again all around, and were thrown over in great volume. Some of the more violent declines were in Metropolitan 16 points; sugar 10; People's gas 10; Rock Island 7: Brooklyn transit 7; Manhattan 6; New York Central 5; Great Northern preferred 61/2; Federal steel 5; Burlington 5; Louisville 4; Continental tobacco and a large number of railroad stocks 3 points or over. The sudden jump in the money rate to 50, 70, 100 and 125 per cent, reflected

the imperative needs of large interests to meet engagements. The alarm spread in the stock market and violent inroads were made on values. Drops of a point and upward were made through many successive stages. Some of the extreme declines were tobacco 21½; Metropolitan 20¼; Tennessee coal 16; People's gas 13; Brooklyn transit and Federal steel 124; Manhattan 9; Continental tobacco 104; sugar 11% and a long list of stocks from 5 to 9 points. The violence of the decline and the large profit offered to bear operators invited buying to cover short contracts and prices recovered by successive jumps of a point. The rally in Metropolitan reached 10 points and in Federal steel, tobacco, Brooklyn transit, sugar, Tennessee coal 5 to 7 points. The market closed in a highly excited state and renewed declines in some portions of the list while other stocks continued their recovery. The tone was utterly unsettled and irregular.

MARKET DEMORALIZED.

The air on the stock exchange at the

opening today was one of apprehen-sion and uncertainty. The comparative steadiness of the London market before the opening here showed that some power of resistance to the depressing effect of the military disasters in South Africa had developed there, promising that much relief to the situation there; but the threatening tone of the closing dealings here on Saturday served as an admonition that our markets had troubles of their own to All commission houses were deface. manding large additional margins, and the disposition of tired holders to let go and take their losses made it certain that offerings to liquidate would be heavy. Supporting orders at the opening saved the market from violent osses, and sugar worked back to a point above last night. It soon became clear that the only motive for supporting the market was to afford opportunity to realize. Forced liquidation on a large scale was obviously going on and the tone became weak. #### Work on the New Shaft Was Started on Saturday.

Word was received at the office of the May Day Mining company today from the mine, stating that the new machinery which was started up last

At this level, a station will be cut and a drift will be run to the vein which, it is thought, will be less than 45 feet from the shaft at that depth. The new shaft is to have one compartment and manway.
