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Measures Offered by Marks Provide for State Control In Cities.

EMINENT DOMAIN COMES UP.

Senator Benner X, Smith Secures Passage of Act Vetocd by Governor Spry-County Boundaries.

Senate Elli 89, by Mr. Marks, providing that police and fire departmenus of cities of the first class shall be under control of a state board. passed the senate yesterday after-The bill occasioned considerthie debate, Senators Benner X. Such a bill was passed by the house two years ago, but was killed in the senate. The board provided for in the measure is to be appointed by the governor, and shall consist of three members, one of whom shall be president, at a salary of \$2,100 a year, with a salary of \$2,00 for each of the other. a stary of \$1.00 for each of the other members. The terms of office for all shall its four years. The bill stipulates that the pelice department shall consist of a chief, one or more captains of police and such officers as the board may direct. A chief and assistant chiefs are provided for the fire department, with such other officers, men and employes as the board shall direct. If matted into law, the bill will go into effect Jan. 1, 1910.
