

PRESIDENT SMITH VISITS HONOLULU

Large Delegation, Including Hawaiian Band, Welcomes Him At the Oceanic Dock.

SOME TOUCHING INCIDENTS.

Venerable Leader Greets Old Blind Woman in Her Native Tongue—Storms on the Voyage.

Under the heading of "Welcome to Mormon Leader," The Pacific Commercial Advertiser of Honolulu, Hawaii, on Saturday Feb. 27, printed the following:

"President Joseph E. Smith of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints of Salt Lake City, Utah, accompanied by eleven others, arrived on the Alameda to visit in the islands for about a month. He was received at the Oceanic dock by a large delegation of Hawaiians and members of the faith and was given a glad welcome by the Hawaiian band. The reception by the latter was a special mark of favor in return for many kindnesses to the landmen while they were in Salt Lake City a couple of years ago during their memorable tour of the islands. President Smith was warmly greeted with this welcome and personally thanked the bandmen.

"In his party are Mrs. Smith and their four daughters, Mrs. Nibley, president of the church, Mrs. Cannon, wife of the wealthy mining operator, A. W. McCune of Utah and Peru, and Bishop Woolley, who is in charge of the Mormon mission in the Hawaiian Islands with headquarters at Laie, a sugar plantation of the Mormon Church at the other end of this island.

GREETED AT CHURCH.

"After being welcomed by Elder Abraham Fernandez, one of the young elders from Utah who are spending their mission service of three years in the islands, the party of the Latter Day Saints then went to the Mormon Church on the main island, where a large crowd greeted them, and where at once the visitors sat down to a Hawaiian lunch, replete with native delicacies. To President and Mrs. Smith the Hawaiian lunch was not new, for the President came here first in 1854 on his first mission and has since been here several times since, but to Bishop and Mrs. Nibley, Mrs. McCune, the Misses Nibley and Smith, the feast was a novelty, but they enjoyed it.

"During the time the Hawaiian band played in the yard, Mr. Nibley, the President sat near the band much of the time and asked for various pieces to be played. He was greeted by many of the Hawaiians with the deepest of respect.

MEETS OLD FRIEND.

"A touching incident occurred when an old blind Hawaiian woman met the President. They were old friends, for the President met her when he first came to the islands. She cried from pure joy and patted the President's hand. The President spoke to her in Hawaiian and she replied in the same tongue. The Hawaiians were surprised that the President should have retained such a command of the native language, but Bishop Nibley said that it was the common thing when George Q. Cannon was alive for these two men to swing from English into Hawaiian. Both became fluent Hawaiian scholars during their various visits to Honolulu.

"President Smith and family will be the guests of Elder and Mrs. Abraham Fernandez during their stay in Honolulu. They will visit Laie and hold services there, and will also go to other islands. The President is particularly anxious to visit the volcano this time. On Sunday next he will preach in the Mormon church on Punchbowl. The entire party will leave for the mainland again about March 22.

FIRE AND POLICE BILL IS PASSED

Measures Offered by Marks Provide for State Control in Cities.

EMINENT DOMAIN COMES UP.

Senator Benner X. Smith Secures Passage of Act Vetoed by Governor—County Boundaries.

Senate Bill 89, by Mr. Marks, providing that police and fire departments of cities of the first class shall be under control of a state board, passed the senate yesterday afternoon. The bill contained considerable debate. Senators Benner X. Smith and Hulaniski attacking it on what they believed to be unconstitutional features. The vote on the measure was as follows: Ayes—Badger, Bunkerhoff, Bullen, Kuehler, Horsey, Hyde, Marks, Seely, Sevy, Stooker, Williams, Wilson—12; Nays—Barton, Hulaniski, Benner X. Smith, John Y. Smith, Mr. President—5; absent and not voting—Six. Miller.

COUNTY BOUNDARIES.

A committee of three will investigate the boundary dispute between Juab and Sanpete counties. Senator Hyde prepared senate bills 88 and 89 to settle the controversy, but withdrew them after the following resolution presented by Senator Kuehler had been adopted:

"That a committee of three be appointed to investigate the propriety of defining the boundaries of Sanpete and Juab counties. Such committee shall have power to administer oaths and hear testimony, to summon witnesses and perform such acts as may be necessary. They shall make a full report to the next session of the legislature, and their necessary expenses shall be paid by the state out of the contingent expenses of the ninth session of the state senate."
