In a Fake Fight at
Butte

ROOT AND RYAN ALSO FAKERS

Pulled off a Grand Fiasco in Philadel-
phia and Crowd Began Throwing
Things at Them.

Several days ago the "News" in noting the proposed "fight" at Butte between Jimmy Flynn, the Colorado pug, and Tommy Reilly, the man from anywhere, made the prediction that this precious pair would in all probability pull off one grand fake. We predicted that their bout would end in another of their famous draws. The expected happened last night. They fooled along for eight rounds much the same as they did in their bout here it was understood that the affair was to end in a draw.

It is hard to understand why any club with pretenses of honesty and square dealing with the public will notice men of Flynn's and Reilly's caliber. They have been exposed many times, and now that they have given an exhibition of their rank work perhaps promoters will see to it that they get no more chances to flim flam the public.

The dispatch, giving an account of the fight, follows:
Butte, Mont., Nov. 23.—Tommy Reilly and Jimmy Flynn tonight fought eight fake rounds, it being understood that if both men were on their feet at the end of the bout would be declared a draw. The men almost refused to go on because of the slim crowd, but finally yielded to the crowd after the crowd threatened trouble. The two men made hardly a pretense of fighting, sparring and clinching, meanwhile exchanging remarks and smiling at each other at one time shaking hands. The crowd kept up a continual cry of fake and left the theater disgusted. The fight was held under the auspices of the Montana Athletic club.

ROOT AND RYAN FAKERS TOO.

Philadelphia, Nov. 23.—The fight between Tommy Ryan, the middleweight pugilist and Jack Root of Chicago, the lightweight, which was scheduled to go on at eight o'clock last night, was a grand fiasco. The fight was ended in the middle of the fourth round by the referee, Jack McGuigan, announcing it a fake. It was the most unsatisfactory pugilistic affair ever held in this city, and the spectators, long before the referee stopped the bout, showed their disapproval of the exhibition by their noisy giving. Trouble was averted by the prompt work of the police in jumping into the ring and protecting the fighters and in clearing the ring.

The managers of both fighters vehemently protested against the action of the referee, but they found few sympathizers in the crowd.

According to the dispatch, these fellows got the money promised them. They were offered \$2,000 and got it before entering the ring. The rest was easy until the spectators began throwing things and then the fakers were to their dressing room by a crowd of policemen.
