THE WESTERN UNION TELEGRAPH LINE.

Last Night's Dispatches.

EASTERN.

Collector Appointed.
CHICAGO, 12.—A few days since, J. F. Hoyt, chief deputy in the office of the late S. A. Irwin, collector of inland revenue for the first Illinois district, was appointed collector, as was announced from Washington, in accordance with the rules of the civil service. It appears that the place has been proffered by certain prominent politicians, among whom are mentioned Senator Logan and Congressman Farwell, to Philip Wadsworth, of this city, and a Washington special to-night states that the latter had been appointed. Hoyt's nomination having been withdrawn. It is stated that Hoyt had satisfactorily performed the duties of collector for two years past, Irwin having been an invalid.

Interview Between Grant and Cameron.

A Washington special says that Senator Cameron of Pennsylvania had long interview with the President yesterday, during which he gave his views of the causes of the recent rebellion, and the best means of restoring the Union. He also stated that he was not in favor of the party leaders, nor with the legislation or principles of the party, but that it was all owing to hard times and to the fact that many people were weary of the stoppage of the manufacturing, out of employment. The Senator thought a great mistake was made in last Congress in not providing an increase of currency to meet the demand of business interests. It is said that the President replied that while there were some local reasons for the defeat in Pennsylvania, he did not think they applied to New York and New Jersey and other States that had reversed their political record, and he informed Cameron very plainly that many of the leaders of the republic were, in his opinion, responsible for the ruin in the political vote. The attacks made on the administration by republicans in Congress, the neglect of the last session to dispose of the financial issues, the indifference to the Louisiana situation, though he had appealed for assistance, and other failures to meet the expectations of the country had contributed to this defeat. Cameron agreed that there had been mismanagement by Congress, but he thought they were not, in the main, responsible for the recent change. He agreed with the President about the third term nonsense had little to do with it. Pennsylvania was the first to declare against it, and yet they had lost the election, so there was no reason for the change. He said that the President had been fully satisfied, as he expressed it, that the President means to do right.

The Mint ready for Work—Raided by Mexicans.

NEW ORLEANS, 12.—The repairs at the mint are completed, and all is ready to commence coining as soon as an assayer is appointed and an appropriation made. A special agent, N. J. News, says that Mexicans are raiding into Texas, and are robbing stores and farms of goods and stock.

Decision Reversed.

WASHINGTON, 12.—The Secretary of the Interior reverses the decision of Commissioner Drummond, of the land office, of the 10th of January, '73, regarding to favor Nebraska, on account for five per cent. of the value of the public lands lying within his line, is included within the reservation made by traders with Indians, the account will be therefore at once prepared, and forwarded to the Interior department, which will control pending claims from several other States.

In the safe burglary trial to-day, Newcomb, testified that Hayes told him the master of the case was the burglar. George S. Mager, of Penn., the Senate librarian, died here to-day of congestion of the lungs.

Postal Matters.

The postal department is discovering by means of its mail contracts were let last spring at surprisingly low figures. The old plan of straw bidders having been thoroughly ventilated, straw bidders have taken their place, and contractors failing to fulfill their obligations, the same old crowd appear and apply for temporary service, supposing that they can make their own terms. They find Mr. Jewell a very difficult person to manage. He acts very much as a dictator, and he is determined to find who is responsible for the acceptance of worthless bonds, and to inflict punishment if he cannot exact reparation. A very useful investigation into postal affairs is probable next session, which will no doubt result in the exposure of some of the most notorious of those who have made fortunes in the straw-bidding business, in letting mail contracts in the west.

Little Rock, 12.—Gov. A. H. Garland and other State officers, elected on the 13th of October, were installed into office to-day, quietly, and without any public ceremony.
