The purchase included five-sevenths of the Utah Power company, capitalized at \$250,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$100 each. It was originally organized for the purpose of furnishing power for the Salt Lake railroad company; also to furnish electric lights. It is at present under lease to the Utah Light and Power

ompany for \$35,000 a year. The lease expires next March. Mr. McCune's plan, no doubt, is to have control of the entire street rall-way system of the city, together with the power to operate it. The power plant was formerly owned by John 1 Dooly, W. J. Menzies, an English capatitalist, R. C. Chambers, Francis Arm. strong, Richard Mackint sh. W. I. Hoge and A. W. McCune. The deal just closed places the Salt Lake Street railway company in almost entire control of the power plant. McCornick's and Jones' banks will have to pay the full amount of taxes that Assessor Eldredge has them on the list for.
