## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Buyers Residence Here**—C. F. Jensen of Mt. Pleasant has bought the J. C. Campbell residence at Second and G streets for \$6,500, and will remove to this city.

**Pencil Maker Here**—Eberhard Faber, the well known pencil manufacturer, and wife are at the Knutsford from Brooklyn, N. Y., en route east after a trip to the Pacific coast.

**Dances Will Continue**—Those who have had charge of the regular weekly dances in Liberty state hall announce that they will continue. The next party will be given tomorrow evening.

**Brown Goes to Coast**—Judge Willis Brown of the juvenile court left yesterday for a visit of several weeks to Los Angeles. During his absence Judge Erickson of the Municipal court will attend to all urgent cases in this court.

**Only 35 are Out**—The local iron-masters report that only 35 journeymen are still out on the strike, and allege that the union had been getting their appointments more diligent in their work in Montana although they were not half through their apprenticeship.

**Changed the Name**—The Second Street club committee which met yesterday afternoon, proposed to change the name of the club to Second Avenue and considered the extension of the street into the military reservation. The club will meet tomorrow afternoon to further discuss the situation.

**The Florists' Club**—The newly organized Florists' club of this city, has chosen the following officers: President, Charles Alt; vice president, L. M. Law; secretary, Charles Butchart; treasurer, W. H. King; sergeant-at-arms, Fred Laker. The Florists' club is a social club, a membership of over 20 has been secured, and at the next meeting a constitution and by-laws is to be adopted.

**Ell V. Haley Dead**—Ell V. Haley, father of Dr. P. H. Haley and Mrs. J. D. Harrison, died in this city yesterday, at the age of 79. Deceased was a native of Pennsylvania, but removed to Illinois where he resided for 40 years, and then went to California. He came to Utah two years ago, and lived with his daughter on P street up to the date of his death.

**Gone Up in Smoke**—During 1905, there were consumed in Montana, Idaho and Utah, 12,421,150 cigars, an increase over the previous year of 317,000. Utah produced many more cigars than either of the other states, being the one state to show a gain. The cigars made in Utah totaled 5,361,556. Idaho made 2,532,754, a decrease of 54,338. Montana made 4,707,840, a decrease of 75,432. The increase of Utah totals 57,566. Montana pays 60 per cent of the tax of the district composed of these three states, on whiskey and beer.

**Arbor Day Suggestion**—President F. R. Stephens of the Civic league left for Chicago last night, on a business trip, and delegated O. H. Hewlett of the board of governors to appoint a committee to call on local business men to issue a proclamation calling for the closing of all local business places on Arbor day, April 16, in order to allow the public generally to engage in the planting of trees. The street railway service will haul to any point on the company's lines for a nominal price, all the crushed shale the city or league can use in macadamizing the streets.

**Meeting Tomorrow**—There will be a meeting at the hall Friday, April 6, at 4:15 p. m., under the auspices of the ladies' auxiliary of the Manufacturers and Merchants' association. This meeting is for the purpose of bringing before the ladies of the state the promotion of home industries and manufactures. It is proposed, further, to take the initial steps toward organizing as many manufacturing concerns as possible. All women residing outside of the city are urgently requested to attend. Mr. Nathaniel Thomas, Miss Lydia Holmgren, Mrs. Mary F. Kelly and Miss Lydia D. Alder will be in charge of the meeting.

**KILLED BY DRINK.**

**Former Salt Lake Woman Comes to Sad Ending in Denver.**

Word comes from Denver of the death there of Mrs. Nettie Todd, once a resident of Utah. She was the wife of Thomas S. Todd, who served a term in the Utah penitentiary for the killing of Patrick Desmond, a Denver officer, who was visiting in Ogden, where he was shot by Todd. After the latter was liberated from prison, he went from bad to worse. The wife became discouraged by the misdoings of her husband, and she took to drink, with the avowed determination of drowning her own life. Whether she succeeded in the former is not known, but the latter result came a few days ago when she died in a pauper's grave at the Colorado metropolis.
