Hot and Dry—Accidents—Emigrants.

OGDEN CITY,
July 15, 1874.

Editor Deseret News:

The heat in this section continues without the prospects of an early abatement. We have for some time past been hoping for and expecting rain, which is much needed, but in this respect we have been disappointed, for although the clouds would frequently loom up over the lake, gather blackness, and assume a threatening aspect, anon a brisk wind would spring up, and in a short time all would be blown over.

Last evening a sad and nearly fatal accident happened to the family of Mr. Jos. Taylor (of the firm of Taylor Bros. of this city), and part of the family of Wm. S. Reed. These two families own, between them, a team and light wagon. Mr. R. runs the team. These people were returning from an evening's ride, and when near the residence of Lorin Farr, Esq., a runaway team, belonging to a person named Frank Hall, came rushing madly along the road, leaping upon the wagon in which Mrs. Taylor and children were riding (I believe there were nine children in the vehicle), crushed it down and threw the whole party to the ground, one of the horses falling on Miss Julia Taylor, a girl about nine years old, and who doubtless, but for the timely assistance rendered by Mr. O. Badger, would have been killed. As it was, she received some very serious and dangerous injuries. Her right leg was broken just above the ankle, one of her lower ribs was fractured, she was bruised in the back and chest, and she also received some internal injury, but to what extent, Dr. Anderson informed me to-day, he has not fully ascertained. She breathed with difficulty, and bled profusely from the mouth and nostrils. She, however, is receiving careful attention, and we are hopeful of her recovery.

The rest of the party received injuries more or less severe. Josiah Reed, who was driving the team, had his left ear split open and almost severed from his head. Dr. Anderson put several stitches in the mutilated ear, and he is doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances. The Dr. is also attending the other children, and under his well known skill and attention to his patients it is hoped they will soon recover.

The emigrants who arrived this p.m. appeared to be in excellent spirits. All of them looked well, and although many of them could not speak the English language, on their arrival here they soon found a great many people who could speak their own, and they were happy.

A PROCLAMATION.

BY THE GOVERNOR.

UTAH TERRITORY,
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

To whom it may concern:

Know ye, that by virtue of the authority in me vested, I, George L. Woods, Governor of the Territory of Utah, do by this my proclamation fix the times and places for holding the Supreme and District Courts in and for said Territory of Utah as follows, to-wit:

The Supreme Court in and for said Territory shall be held in the city and county of Salt Lake on the second Monday in the month of January, and on the first Monday in the month of June of each year hereafter, unless otherwise ordered by the Governor; the Court to convene at each regular term thereof at the hour of one o'clock in the afternoon of the days designated herein.

The District Court in and for the First Judicial District shall be held in the City of Provo, in the County of Utah, on the third Monday in the month of September, on the third Monday in the month of November, on the third Monday in the month of February, and on the third Monday in the month of May of each year hereafter, unless otherwise ordered by the Governor; the Court to convene at each regular term thereof, at one o'clock in the afternoon of the days designated herein.

The District Court in and for the Second Judicial District shall be held in the city and county of

Beaver on the first Monday in the month of September, on the first Monday in the month of November, on the first Monday in the month of February, and on the first Monday in the month of April of each year hereafter, unless otherwise ordered by the Governor; the Court to convene at each regular term thereof at the hour of eleven o'clock in the forenoon of the days designated herein.

The District Court in and for the Third Judicial District shall be held in the city and county of Salt Lake on the first Monday in the month of October; on the first Monday in the month of December; on the first Monday in the month of March, and on the first Monday in the month of May of each year hereafter, unless otherwise ordered by the Governor; the Court to convene at each regular term thereof at the hour of eleven o'clock in the forenoon of the days designated herein.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the Territory to be affixed.

Done at Salt Lake City this 14th day of July, A. D. 1874, and of the Independence of the United States the ninety-ninth.
