Badger, would have been killed. As it was, she received some very serious and dangerous injuries. Her right leg was broken just above the ancle, one of her lower ribs was fractured, she was bruised in the back and chest, and she also received some internal injury, but to what extent, Dr. Anderson informed me to-day, he has not fully ascertained. She breathed with difficulty, and bled profusely from the mouth and nostrils. She, however, is receiving careful attention, and we are hopeful of her recovery. The rest of the party received

injuries more or less severe. Josiah Reed, who was driving the team, had his left ear split open and almost severed from his head. Dr. Anderson put several stitches in the mutilated ear, and he is doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances. The Dr. is also attending the other children, and under his well known skill and attention to his patients it is hoped they will soon recover.
