the only way to make it valid where vetord is for the Council to proceed to vote and dispose of the objection, as provided in the law. Filed.

THE NEW CITY JAIL,

Regarding the erection of the new city jail the committee on prisons reported as follows: Your committee has given much time and careful consideration to the various plans and designs submitted by the various architects in response to the advertisements calling for competitive plans, and while all the propositions are good in many respects and worthy of attention, we have come to the conclusion and recommend'that the plan of Mr. Wm. Carroll be adopted and your committee be authorized to advertise at once for hids on his plans and specifications. We further report that the cost of the new jail shall not exceed the amount specified, viz.: \$25,000.

THE OLD FIGHT OVER AGAIN.

The committee on waterworks re-ported in the matter of soliciting bids for the purchase of water pipe, and submitted the following bids:

Howard Harrison Iron Company \$33 85 per ton George M. Scott & Co. 34 75 per ton Dennis, Long & Co. 36 00 per ton Rhodes Bros. 38 00 per ton All based on delivery on care at Salt Lake Oity for the following amount of pipe: 163 tons of Brinch cast pipe; 50 tons of 6-inch cast iron

pipe.

Bids were solicited from four other nipe concerns, hut they declined to make a proposal. The committee recommended that the pipe he pur-chased from Rhodes Bros., as they were the lowest bidders.

Hardy-I move that the matter be

referred to the Mayor.

Moran-The Mayor told me personally that he would have absolutely nothing to do with the matter.

Hardy-I think that matter should go to the Mayor with the committee

associated, with power to act.
Wantland—I think that Mr. Hardy should appreciate our situation. There is no use at all to make such reference There as the committee and the Mayor can-not and will not agree. When they come together there is always friction.

Moran-There is one thing that always puzzles me when I come into this council chamber to meeting and it is this: Any committee excepting the committee on water works can do as it pleases apparently, but let the waterworks committee do a single thing and the Mayor will find fault. We see that other committees can advertise for buildings even when \$25,000 are involved in the transaction all right. Something is wrong and you should all understand it.

Lawson-There is no mistake as to the Mayor being opposed to the work

of the committee.

Bell-I know that there is no use to consult with the Mayor and therefore I am now prepared to stand hy the committee in its conclusions. The pipe

is reeded and badly, too.

Rich-Several days ago the committee on waterworks to whom power was given to secure bids for the purchase of this pipe met in this council chamber to open the bids; but the recollection of the old fight came vividly before us. Then, in order to be on the safe side we waited for nearly two hours before opening the bids in order that that work could be done in the presence of the mayor but that official declared that he would have nothing to do with the matter and informed the committee that is they persisted in carrying the work on he would veto the matter as soon as it reached his hands as he wanted us to understand that we were infringing on his rights. This being the case we should bear in mind that it is useless for us to do anything unless we have ten votes to carry it over the mayor's veto.

Hardy's motion was noted down after which the report was adopted on a vote of nine to two, Messrs. Folland and Hardy voting against the motion

to adopt.

THE DINWOODEY GRADE.

Henry Dinwoodey and fourteen others sent in the following communication:

We, the undersigned property owners of the south side of First South street be-tween Main and West Temple streets, tween Main and West Temple streets, respectfully petition that the sidewalk grade in front of our property be allowed to remain as given to Mr. Dinwoodey and established by the city engineer in 1890; and that said sidewalk in front of the Jennings Bros.' Investment property and the Eagle Emporium property be changed so as to conform with said grade so established in 1890; and that the Said sidewalk now existing on the north side and in front of said Jennings' property and the Eagle Emporium property be made to conform to said grade above referred to at the expense of Salt Lake City, it being understood that Mr. Dinwoodey will pay \$300 toward the regrading and reconstruction of the same.

The committee on streets recom-mended that the grade be raised as suggested, and that the matter be referred to the city engineer with power to act. The report was adopted.

HUNTER'S ICE POND ABOLISHED.

The committee on Jordan canal and irrigation reported as follows in the matter of the communication from the watermaster with reference to Hunter's ice pond, and asking for instruction with reference to the damaging of City Creek by Mr. Hunter: "We have considered the matter and recommend that inasmuch as the Eighth West street canal has been permanently street canal has been permanently ds mmed up at Eighth South street, that there appears to be no longer any need of the Ninth West street canal from Third South to North Temple streets, the following resolution be adopted:

Resolved. That the street supervisor be and he is hereby authorized and instructed to take necessary steps to have the said canal on Ninth West street filled up and and remove all obstructions and other-wise open said street for the public use.

Adopted.

\$200 FOR HORSE FEED.

The special committee reported that in the matter of the communication from Watermaster Harvey and Street Supervisor Hines, asking that they be compensated for the use of horse and cart at the rate of \$1 per day, that they had carefully considered the matter and would recommend that each be allowed \$200 per annum, payable in monthly installments of \$18.66.

After considerable discussion the matter was laid on the table for one

week.
