"THE DARK SECRET."

A DANISH vessel has picked up at sea and brought safely to shore, the solitary occupant of a small vessel which had to be abandoned. It was the Dark Secret, which sailed from Boston June 18, commanded by Capteri Andrews and bound for England, which he expected to reach in forty-five days.

The Dark Secret was a 12 foot dory, the smallest vessel that ever attempted the voyage. It was duly provisioned but not duly manned, for the venturesome Captain was the only human being on board. He is an old sallor and once crossed the Atlantic, with his brother Asa in company, on the Nautilus, a 19-foot dory, 'making the trip in forty-five days. This was in
