Witnesses Sworn Testify to a Nunfber Of Cases of Free and Easy Uses Of City Property.

An investigation of the official conduct of Jacob T. Raleigh, supervisor of streets, instituted by the city council by reason of charges preferred by William Jones, had its commencement last night. For a time the proceedings promised to be comedy pure and simple, of the kind designated as farce,

and considerable element of that churacter permeated the doings of the even-

ing. Of the members of the city council there were present Cowburn, Hall, Holly, Fernstrom, Black, Reedali, Wood, O'Donnell, Raybould and Ferry. In the absence of President Davis, Mr. Ferry was chosen chairman, The room was crowded to its capacity, inside and outside the railing, and various antercoms were also occupied with members of city departments and oth-ers. Among the persons present and who watched with interest every phase of the case, or "phrase," as Council-man Reedall was plensed to put it, was Mayor Bransford, and near him sat ex-Councilman M. E. Mulvey. Early in the proceedings it was moved by Councilman Reedall that Mr. Raleigh be permitted to be represent-ed by counsel. Councilman Wood, who is the head and front of the in-vestigntion, objected to such an ar-rangement. "If you want my con-

rangement. "If you want my con-sent to take this case into the crim-inal court, you can have it right quick." he said.

FAVORED COUNSEL.

Fernstrom, Hall and Holly favored the motion, and when it came to a vote only Black and Wood voted nega-tively. Then it was proposed that witness be put under oath, Wood again objected, basing his action on the supposition advanced by City Attorney again objected, basing his action on the supposition advanced by City Attorney Dininny, to the effect that the council had no right to administer an oath. Mr. Dininny, learned counsel, was called for and tried to back up his attitude. He said a witness might be asked but not compelled to be placed under oath, but even if sworn under such circumstances could lie with Im-omity, without fear of prosecution.

such circumstances could lie with im-punity, without fear of prosecution. A motion to give witnesses their will in the matter, that is, to be sworn or not be sworn, as they chose, was lost, and then it was decided that all who testified should do so under oath.

ACCUSED OF GRAFTING.

This is alleged to have been done in various ways, such as keeping his own horses at the expense of the municipality, of having men and toams employed by the city do his private work and that of his friends, of using and permitting to be used city tools, implements, etc., for his own and his company's benefit, for maintaining or permitting to be maintained a system of levying an as-sessment upon employes for the privi-lege of holding their jobs. The witnesses examined last night were "Sandy" Fowler, City Auditor Rudolph Alff, Daniel J. Garrison,George Hampton, J. M. Leonard, and an affi-davit was read from Joseph Faulkner, Mr, Raleigh was on the stand a few minutes in his own behalf, to make explanations relative to one phase of the case.
