A BILL FOR AN ACT PREVENTING CRIMES AGAINST THE ELECTIVE FRANCHISE.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Utah, That every person charged with the performance of any duty under the provisions of any law of this Territory, who, in the performance of such duty, shall knowingly and fraudulently act in violation of or contravention of any provision of any law of this Territory, shall be guilty of a crime, and shall be punished by fine not exceeding one thousand dollars or by imprisonment in the penitentiary not exceeding two years, or by both.

SEC. 2. Every person who willfully causes, procures or allows himself to be registered in any precinct or city register list in any county, knowing that he is not entitled to such registration, and every person who willfully causes, procures, advises, encourages or assists in other person to be registered in any precinct or city register list in any county, knowing that he is not entitled to such registration, shall be guilty of a crime, and shall be punished by fine not exceeding one thousand dollars or by imprisonment in the penitentiary not exceeding two years, or by both.

SEC. 3. Every person not entitled to vote who fraudulently votes, and every person who fraudulently votes, shall be guilty of a crime, and shall be punished by fine not exceeding one thousand dollars or by imprisonment in the penitentiary not exceeding two years, or by both.

SEC. 4. Every person who fraudulently introduces into the ballot box, or who fraudulently introduces into the ballot box, shall be guilty of a crime, and shall be punished by fine not exceeding one thousand dollars or by imprisonment in the penitentiary not exceeding two years, or by both.

SEC. 5. Every person who procures, aids, encourages, or assists in other person to be registered in any precinct or city register list in any county, knowing that he is not entitled to such registration, shall be guilty of a crime, and shall be punished by fine not exceeding one thousand dollars or by imprisonment in the penitentiary not exceeding two years, or by both.
