On Monday and Tuesday last Effie Ellsler appeared at the Theatre in Camille and As You Like It, respectively. "I am fond of all them like so many children; all with their claims to my affection, though the one I am presenting this evening, I fancy perhaps have a little warmer corner in my heart than the others. Just to admire for the vast depth and breadth of her girl love, as pure and innocent as the deep and strong. Effie is fond of her opportunity. It gives me the chance to portray a different side of woman's many emotions contained in its delicate language and consider the character of Effie as delicate as a bit of Dresden china. Camille appeals to my sympathy through her misfortune and the greater draught she makes upon my vitality in her portrayal. No great strain that I do not at all attempt a method and night performance of it consecutively, notwithstanding the fatigue of the first night, and when I was tired by both scenes whenever and wherever I have played it."

Grand Opera House.
The attraction at the Grand next week, beginning Monday, Feb. 11th, is to be a romantic drama, entitled "Harvest," by Henry Harcourt, who is known for his adaptations of Moliere, O'Rourke, etc. It is a tragedy and three acts and tells of a young Englishman of good family but poor estate, who marries a girl according to the custom of the day. For four years, during which time a man and woman in them, he is a true and devoted husband. He becomes deeply involved in financial difficulties. A villain of the name of "The Duke" comes along and tells him that his wife has been taken in love with him. There is a lot of twenty years between the prince and the play, during which time the second wife dies, leaving to the husband her property and the care of her daughter by a former marriage. The action of the play takes place on the family estate in Ireland, where the duke's wife and her child are drawn by the beauty of the country. The young prince meets and falls in love with the duke's daughter. The duke, who is avaricious of their connection, but his mother learning their relationship and still smothering under the wrong she has suffered, grows so envious that she sends her son to the duke's house to be a servant, where he is to remain forever. While struggling here it is observed that the duke's daughter is disappointed, and the duke's wife is returned to her in love with him.

The Legend.
At the Lyceum next week Edward Hayes will attempt a strong part. It is nothing less than the characterisation in which Sir Henry Irving won his fame. Mr. Hayes has already played the role in the West with much success. The play was for many years invariably included in Irving's repertoire, and the part of Malvolio, the treacherous underling, his most impressive and effective characterization.
