# TALK RAMPANI

A Plan on Foot to Operate Nearly All of Tonopah's Mines Under One Management.

Mac Namara, West End and North Star Will Probably Remain Out Of Proposed Merger.

Consolidation talk is rampant in Tonopah. According to a special to the Goldfield Sun, there is a scheme on foot to consolidate nearly everything In sight; that is, the principal producing mines. Of course it may take many months to work out the details of the plan, and again, the whole proposition may fall through and the mines continue to operate as they are today But here is what the Sun's correspond-"As it stands at present it looks as

though the only shipping mines which will remain out of the huge concern are the West End, the McNamara and the North Star. So far the deal apparently includes the Tonopah Mining company, the Tonopah Extension, the Tonopah Belmont, the Montana Tono-pah, the Midway and the Jim Butler

"The Tonopah Mining company, the Jim Butier and the Belmont are in such a position that consolidation would be easy at a moment's notice and the feeling of the Montana for them is friendly. The Midway, con-trolled by Broughers, Douglass, Mc-Quillan and the Stensons, is more nearly independent and may be more difficult to swing into line.

"The opposed interests of Schwab and McKane of the Extension and To-

nopah Mining company have long been looked on as incompatibles, but if they are to be shaken together in the merger emulsion, the rest is easy. It will mean to a great extent, an alliance between the Schwab interests and these of Brook and his associates.

"Nothing is yet decided as regarding the proposed allotment of shares and as each company except one is far above the two dollar mark and has a

"Each mine, save the Jim Butter, is a dividend payer, and these are paid quarterly except by the Montana and Jim Butler. 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
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
