

The fire started near Nicoglemus, in Graham County. The wind, which was blow-ing forty miles an hour, carried the phosphate powders.

OFFCE OF THE GOVERNOR, PRESCOTT, Aliz., March 24, 1887. Sirs-I respectfully call your atten-tion to annexed copy of official cor-PRESCOTT, March 18, 1887.

Brig-General Nelson A. Miles, Commanding Department of Arizona Los Angeles, Cal.: Sir:-Referring to your telegram of the 11th inst., (copy of which I have received by mail,) and also my telegraphic reply thereto, permit me to say

that I deeply regret the disturbance created by the few renegade Tonto Indians, through which the life of Lieut. Mott has been sacrificed, and the peace and security of our people again disturbed. Having full condence in the ability of the troops under your command to capture or descript these Indian outlets and being stroy these Indian outlaws, and being desirous that the laws of the white man be enforced against all criminals within the jurisdiction of the Territory, I submit for your consideration Would it not be well, in the above in-

stances, when captured, to turn over the perpetrators of the outrages detailed in your telegram, to the civil authorities of the Territory, to be tried, and if convicted, punished according to the measure of their de-sorts? thus establishing the precedent that our laws punish with equal se-verity all men gulity of crime, without regard to race propodition, and so teach the salutary lesson that no Indian can claim immunity from crime because he is an Indian.
