WESTERN DISPATCHES.

BALTIMORE, 25.—Ex-convicts officer Thomas J. Wilson, sentenced to three years imprisonment for embezzlement, has been pardoned by the President.

WASHINGTON, 25.—The Senate, at 9 o'clock this morning, after a session of more than nine hours, by the requisite two-thirds vote, advised the President to negotiate an additional article to the treaty of Washington, on the basis recently proposed by the British government.

The commissioners appointed by San Francisco in opposition to the action of the Senate, and a telegram was sent by the latter to minister Schenck, advising him with the facts for the information of the British government.

It is expected that on Monday a response will be received from the British government, and that the ratification of the treaty will be completed.

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Although many senators last night declined to give any point, and refused to converse on the subject, the result of the action of the Senate was shown within the hour after the executive session closed. It is believed that Great Britain will assent to the modification of the article, as she now, with the United States, is anxious for the tribunal of arbitration to proceed without further hindrance.

The subject will next come before the Senate on the ratification of the article. The action of the Senate, in passing the supplemental article to the treaty, as being in accordance with the articles of the great treaty, the people, particularly the mercantile community. The Herald pronounces the action of the Senate as a national humiliation.

The question is whether the people will accept the amended treaty as a final settlement of the account with England, and says the settlement is between the administrations and not between the nations.

The Times' Washington special says in relation to the additional article, as agreed to by the Senate, that it is substantially as amended and reported by the foreign committee. And of the main amendments is a change of the language covering the agreement with reference to indirect claims in future, as to include all indirect and incidental claims. In the rule as proposed by Great Britain, the words "such claims," as used in the strict interpretation, would have confined the agreement of parties to such indirect claims only as are subject to the present controversy; therefore it is provided that the rule shall cover that, in broader terms, by indirect or incidental claims shall be presented by one nation against another for the failure to observe neutrality. The vote was strictly party.

A call will appear to morrow for a meeting of free traders, at St. Louis, Mo., on the 30th inst. Wm. Cullen Bryant will preside. David A. Wells, Edward Atkinson, and others will speak. The call says, the reference of tariff reform to the Congressional Districts by the Cincinnati convention, was the evasion of the issue, and the absolute free traders from any obligation to support the nominees. The call looks directly to an organization for the accomplishment of tariff reform in the coming Presidential election.

NASHVILLE, Tenn.—A mass meeting of German citizens, held here, last evening, endorsed the Liberal Republican movement, and the nomination of Greeley and Brown.

Voorhees' speech at Terre Haute, last night, is universally condoned by the Democrats here. The Union and American says the friends of Greeley must re-organize and counteract the influence at work against his adoption at Baltimore, and call on all friends of the Cincinnati nominees to close the ranks, ignore petty quibbling and unite to the work before them.

At Brookville, Indiana, yesterday, the jury found McDonald Meek guilty of the murder of Harrison, his father-in-law, and fixed the sentence at imprisonment for life. Cheek has been twice convicted and sentenced to death, this being the third trial. An effort will be made to secure another.

MEXICAN.

CITY OF MEXICO, 17.—Congress has approved of the extension of ample powers to Juarez. The local authorities of Chiapas have assassinated Jose, a native of Cleveland, O., and other Americans are imprisoned, persecuted, and their property despoiled. The reason of these outrages is that the Americans demanded an investigation of indignities put upon them, before the United States and Mexican mixed commission.

WESTERN DISPATCHES.

REDWOOD CITY, 25.—There was a Mexican accident here last evening, caused by an inexperienced man taking a lighted candle into the house. The works will be running again on Monday.

EUROPEAN.

PARIS.—The generals who received Napoleon's recent letter, assuming the responsibility of the surrender at Sedan, sent it to their superiors.

MADRID.—Serrano proclaimed a full pardon to all insurgents voluntarily surrendering. Large numbers in Biscaia availed themselves of his clemency.

Nebeker in time to give them the news from Zion. They are deeply interested in hearing the details of affairs in Utah from time to time.

The elders who have lately returned from their missions to the several islands of this group, give many testimonials of healing the sick during their labors among the people—a few cases from the many I submit for your consideration and publication if you think proper.

off the fifth time she stood upon her feet and moved about by taking very short steps, but soon she was able to run.

A man afflicted with a contagious disease, in order to evade the law kept himself in the mountains and places of secret resort. Being found by an Elder of the church, he pleaded for assistance and was told if he would believe in the Lord Jesus Christ he should be healed, saying he would exercise all the faith he could. The Elder anointed him with oil and laid hands upon him three times. He was restored to health and when he went around among the people they were astonished and wished to know what doctor had healed him.

There are over one hundred similar cases reported by our returned missionaries.

The king's cabinet have been advising him to stop the "Mormons" proceeding on these islands, but he answered that he could not do it without breaking the constitution, so report says.

The statistics of this mission stand favorable at the present, showing the unprecedented increase of 654 during the last six months. I append the following report for the half year ending March 31st, 1872:

Lale 352 old members; 2 baptized; total 354.

Total in the mission, deducting 90 which are numbered in the branches whence they emigrated, 2,627.
