PARTING OF WAYS.

This brought forth a stormy de-fense from Messrs. Paine and Floed. In giving his views of the question, the latter said in part: "One of the true principles of Democracy—the prin-ciple of all the beautiful principles of Democracy—in my humble estimation is that of religious liberty. Some of you in this convention are endeavoring to trample underneath your feet this sacred principle. Don't do it. I want to be with you. I have followed you where you have led in the past Democrat has been more faithful than I in casting my votes for the Democrat-ic party. I have been faithful, but if the Democratic party intends to fight religion, this with me must be a parting of the ways." The resolution first submitted was finally passed with an amendment denouncing polygamy and the interfer-ence of the church in politics. The convention affirmed their alle-giance to the Democratic principles of Jefferson and Jackson, and endorsed William J. Bryan for president in the next election. They commend the work of Senator Dubois, and endorsed him for re-election, instructing their delefor re-election, instructing their dete-gates to vote as a unit for his renomi-mation. They made no endorsements for governor. However, in fererring to the present state administration, they passed the following resolution: "Resolved, that we denounce the present state administration as wasterul, $e\mathbf{x}$ travagant, corrupt and incompetent,' Governor Gooding, Hon.
