

would, armed with a writ of *habeas corpus* issued from a Denver court, try to take the prisoner off the train at Cheyenne. Norris says he became aware before he left San Francisco of the plan, which was to get out a *habeas corpus* and have the prisoner released at Denver by swearing an *alibi*. Norris surmised that the sheriff at Cheyenne would meet him with the writ, and to mislead him, telegraphed from Laramie that he wanted assistance in transferring the prisoner to another train, and would arrive on the regular train. Then Norris procured a special train at Laramie, and accompanied by Superintendent Dickinson of the Union Pacific, made a run of 234 miles to the Denver Junction, dashing through Cheyenne without stopping, and overtaking the train from Denver at that place. Houch appeared chagrined when he saw the detective's plan, but says he would not have gone with the writ, but preferred to go to Chicago and stand trial for the murder of Lohman, for he had done the killing in self-defense. At the depot in Cheyenne, the passenger room was filled with a disappointed crowd, comprising gamblers from all quarters.

New York, 26.—Richard O'Keefe, John Conlin and Michael H. O'Donnell, "fire alarm fiends," are sentenced to the penitentiary for one year each.

New Orleans, 27.—The election fraud cases were continued to-day. Wm. Buckney, deputy sheriff, serving as supervisor, swore he could not identify his own signature on the tally sheets. He was arrested for perjury. John Buckney, his brother, accused by the United States Supervisor of representing the democratic party, testified he knew the accused, his brother, but did not know his brother's signature.

St. Louis, 27.—In the Criminal Court this morning, the plea of Russell Brown, of manslaughter, for killing his grandmother, Mrs. Sarah Davis, and the plea of Pat McGinn, implicated in the same offense, were accepted by the court and both sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary.

San Francisco, 27.—J. C. Vanness, ex-Commissioner of Immigration, was examined to-day in the police court on the charge of embezzling funds of his office, and discharged from custody.

Washington, 27.—In the Star route trial, the grand jury came into court with a number of presentments, among them the following: United States vs. T. J. Brady, for unlawfully receiving money and postal drafts to the amount of \$50,000 while Second Assistant Postmaster General, from Jas. B. Price, as a reward for making a contract of mail service with Price on July 13th, 1880, upon the Star route from Socorro to Silver City, New Mexico; against W. Pitt Kellogg and Thos. J. Brady, for conspiring on April 17th, 1880, with James B. Price, to defraud the United States by means of false oaths and fraudulent allowance for expedition, and false and fraudulent claims to be made for increased pay for expedition on post routes from Monroe to Shreveport in Louisiana, and San Antonio to Corpus Christi in Texas, the said routes being then in the name of Jas. B. Price as contractor; against Wm. P. Kellogg, setting forth that on April 17th, 1880, whilst Senator from Louisiana, he did, unlawfully receive from James B. Price, contractor on the Star routes from Monroe to Shreveport, Louisiana, and from San Antonio to Corpus Christi, Tex., a certain sum of money, postal drafts and promissory notes, together of the value of \$20,000 for his service in preceeding, and inducing Thos. J. Brady, Second Assistant Postmaster General, to award and allow to Price all the increase of pay and compensation for carrying the mail with increased speed on and over each of said routes, and corruptly influencing Brady therein. Another presentment was against Brady for having on or about April 17th, 1880, while Second Assistant Postmaster General, unlawfully received certain money, postal drafts and a note, together being of the value of \$20,000 as compensation, for the service of awarding to James B. Price, mail contractor, a contract on each of the routes from Monroe to Shreveport, La., and San Antonio to Corpus Christi, Tex., to carry the mail with increased speed, and for increased pay. The witnesses named are Thomas A. Walsh; James B. Price; Joseph Cochran and J. W. Brady.

Detroit, 26.—A libel suit begun in this city to-day is likely to last two weeks. Prof. Donald Macglean of the medical department of the State University, sues James E. Scripps, editor of the *Evening News*, for \$50,000 damages for publishing from a Canadian paper an article asserting that the Professor committed adultery with a female patient from Tilsonburg, Ontario, who went to Ann Harbor for medical treatment.

New York, 26.—Captain Irving and chief officer Barratt of the White Star steamer *Republic*, were arrested to-day in a civil suit for \$25,000 damages by Thomas Douse Steward, rescued from the wrecked steamer *Glamorgan* and delivered on board the *Republic* on suspicion of being implicated in the Phoenix park murders.

The Star understands that Jay Gould is going west in a few days, extending his tour to California.

Chicago, 26.—Edward Donovan, partner of Erastus Whitney, according to the statement of the latter, confessed to converting to his own use \$2,000 cash and proceeds of the sale of \$18,000 worth of goods. Pending negotiations for settlement Donovan disappeared, and Whitney alleges he is a fugitive. The firm dealt in syrups. Donovan has been a partner for two years.

Boston 27.—The full bench of the Supreme Court is engaged in hearing arguments on the question of the law arising on the bill in equity brought by the Union Pacific Co. against the Credit Mobilier of America, for injunction to restrain the Credit Mobilier from prosecuting suits at law against the Union Pacific to recover the balance due the Credit Mobilier for the construction of 246 miles of the Union Pacific Railroad. Amount involved, \$1,778,000.

Victoria, B. C., 27.—A Chinese gang employed on a railroad near New Westminster, to-day made a savage onslaught on their foreman, named Nevine, beating him until he was unconscious, with shovels, picks and axes. He was brought to the hospital in a dying condition. The gang are nominally under arrest. It is not believed they can be held, as there are no white witnesses. Wherever Chinese congregate in large numbers, the whites oppress and threaten to attack them.

Washington, 27.—Ingersoll continued the examination of Dorsey in the star route trial this morning. He was asked if he knew whether he had drawn any check for \$7,000 upon Middleton & Co., in June, 1879, as described by Rerdell. He said he had not drawn a check for that amount, but did draw a check for \$7,500 on June 27th or 28th. It was given Rerdell. (Check shown and identified). Witness did not draw money on the check.

QUEBEC, 26.—Gibb, Liard & Co., wholesale grocers, have failed; liabilities \$100,000; assets nominally \$80,000.

Necomerstown, Ohio, 26.—J. L. Edwards & Co., proprietors of the rolling mills at Canal, Dover, this county, have assigned; liabilities, \$50,000; assets, \$30,000.

Montreal, 27.—Lord & Mann, the largest shippers here of western produce to Great Britain, have assigned; liabilities, \$250,000.

W. A. Desmartan & Co., wholesale grocers and wine merchants, assigned this morning liabilities \$100,000; assets unknown. C. Desmartan at the same time suspended; liabilities \$40,000; assets \$20,000.

Pittsburg, 26.—C. P. Markle & Sons, the largest paper manufacturers in Western Pennsylvania, have assigned without preference, liabilities about \$400,000; assets nearly a million. An official statement just prepared says the failure was precipitated by Captain Cassius C. Markle, one of the firm, who left the city on a train for the West last Thursday, taking with him it is estimated from \$80,000 to \$100,000 of the firm's money, leaving their bank accounts bare, and no funds to meet maturing obligations. On Thursday he drew nearly \$12,000 intended to meet their pay rolls at West Newton, Markleton, and their Coke Works in Westmoreland county. This he took with him. On Friday his brother, Shepard D. Markle, arrived here, and after investigating as far as possible the affairs of the firm, deemed it advisable to make an assignment for the benefit of creditors.

SAN FRANCISCO, 28.—A Portland dispatch says: The Umatilla Indian scare proves to be without foundation. It is believed that the rumor of Indian movements was circulated for the purpose of bringing on a collision which would result in their

removal and throwing open the reservation to land sharks.

MILWAUKEE, 23.—The oligarch manufacturers have taken the initiative in the prospective trouble with employees about raising wages. This afternoon a number of men were discharged from one of the shops. It is said that other manufacturers will do the same.

BRAIDWOOD, Ill., 28.—Four bodies were recovered to-night and will be brought up to-morrow. All the bodies not identified yesterday were fully identified to-day.
