

HARRIMAN MEN ARE IN CONFERENCE

Representatives of Various Roads Meet in Oregon Short Line Board Room.

KRUTTSCHNITT IS PROMOTED.

Gen. Manager of Southern Pacific to Be Director of Transportation for Harriman Lines.

The conference of Harriman officials as outlined in the "News" on Saturday night took place in the Oregon Short Line board room this morning. President Mohler of the O. R. & N. was not present at the meeting owing to his having been recalled to Portland on account of a death in his family.

Although there were a number of rumors on the street this morning relative to pending important changes Vice President and General Manager Julius Kruttschnitt of the Southern Pacific stated after the meeting that there was nothing to give out that would be of interest to the general public. He stated that nothing had been determined upon definitely as to the date of the opening of the Ogden-Lucan cut-off for passenger business, while he had nothing to say regarding the rumored changes at Reno, Green river and other division points.

There were present at the conference Mr. Kruttschnitt, and Charles H. Markham, vice president and general manager of the Southern Pacific lines in Texas; W. H. Bancroft, vice president and general manager of the Union Pacific and Short Line; E. E. Calvin, assistant general manager of the Short Line, and Erastus Young, general auditor for the Harriman system.

PLUM FOR KRUTTSCHNITT.
To the "News" this morning Mr. Kruttschnitt confirmed the story from San Francisco to the effect that he is soon to relinquish the position of general manager for the Southern Pacific and accept one of higher authority in Chicago as director of transportation for the Harriman lines. The title is to be created for him, giving him rank with Traffic Director J. C. Stubbs in the management of all lines operated by the Harriman syndicate. It was stated today by Mr. Kruttschnitt that his successor will be Charles H. Markham, at present vice president and general manager of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio railway and the Houston and Texas Central railroad in Texas. As yet General Manager Kruttschnitt has not learned just when he will relinquish his duties in San Francisco, but he expects that the change will take place within the next four weeks.

SOMETHING DOING.

Gould's Globe Express Company Has Gobbled Up a Wells-Fargo Franchise.

Within a few weeks the Wells Fargo company's express franchise on the Colorado Midland, says the Denver Post, will expire and it will not be renewed. The Globe Express company, controlled by the Goulds, has been granted the new franchise, according to officials of the company. This company will operate not only on the Midland, but on the Denver & Rio Grande and the Denver & Salt Lake. The Globe Express company will handle all the express business from Denver to Salt Lake City over the Gould lines.

The change comes as a surprise to railroad and express people, but it is only one of several important changes to come and may be attributed to George Gould's recent trip over his lines, and his visit to Glenwood Springs. Mr. Gould is planning great things for Glenwood Springs, which he desires to make the fashionable summer resort of the United States. In furthering this project, he has planned to build an imposing country home there, and forsake his palaces at Newport and Lakewood.

In connection with this plan Mr. Gould has signified a desire that Glenwood Springs be made the passenger terminus for the Midland road. It is considered a more desirable place for passengers to connect with west-bound trains than Grand Junction, and Glenwood Springs what he expects it to be in the course of a year or so, it is naturally desirable to have a passenger terminus there.

The change in the express companies will, it is thought, abolish the office now held at Glenwood Springs, in charge of C. M. Keck, joint agent for the Wells, Fargo and the Midland companies.

The new engine house is badly needed. Preliminary work on it has already commenced at North Salt Lake.

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LIBERTY STAKE FULLY ORGANIZED.

First Conference Held in the Salt Lake Assembly Hall Last Night.

STAKE OFFICERS SUSTAINED.

Words of Congratulation and Encouragement Spoken by Church Leaders.

The first conference of the newly organized Liberty stake of Zion was held in the Assembly Hall last night, Counselors Arnold H. Schulthess and Philip S. Maycock presiding. The meeting was for the purpose of completing the organization of the stake and was opened by singing, "We Thank Thee, O God, for a Prophet." Prayer was offered by Elder Eliant S. Hinckley, after which the choir sang, "Come, Dear Lord, Descend and Dwell."

President Schulthess extended a hearty welcome to all assembled and said there were more present than he expected. "These are the kind of Latter-day Saints we desire—those who cannot be kept back by stormy weather. Elder Joseph W. Elder Rudger Clawson said he was

very happy to be with the Saints on this occasion of the first conference of the Liberty Stake of Zion, and urged the brethren and sisters chosen as stake officers to be active, faithful and wide awake in the performance of every duty and thus encourage every member of their stake to be a worker for the cause of God. In conclusion the speaker read from section 35 of the Doctrine and Covenants.

PREST. FRANCIS M. LYMAN.
President Francis M. Lyman congratulated the Saints on the happy selection of officers and the unanimity with which they were sustained. He rejoiced in the good prospects for a prosperous stake of Zion, and called attention to the fact that with the stake fully organized much greater progress should be made and hoped that every man would learn his duty and do it. He said that the Latter-day Saints should be good citizens of the United States or wherever they might chance to be, upholding and sustaining the laws of God and the laws of the land. He hoped the officers of this stake would love the Saints as he had loved those with whom he had labored during the last three years, whom he had come to regard as members of his own family. He advised the Saints to entertain no feeling of jealousy toward those who had been chosen to preside, but render them every possible assistance.

PREST. ANTHON H. LUND.
President Anthon H. Lund congratulated the brethren and sisters of the Liberty stake on being fully organized. He reminded those who had accepted office that we have no honorary offices in the Church. Every man who accepts an office in the Church agrees to attend to the duties of that office. He wanted them to take hold of the work with vim and work for the welfare of this stake of Zion. The speaker closed with a prayer for the Liberty stake and all its members.

The choir sang the anthem, "Light and Truth," and the benediction was pronounced by Elder Charles W. Penrose.

The stake choir, under the leadership of Thomas H. Ashworth, is to be congratulated upon the creditable manner in which it rendered the music of the evening.
