



Chicago, Jan, 10,-The Tribune this morning says:

The International Asphalt company incorporated at Springfield yesterday, has been organized to fight the National Asphalt company, known as the "Asphalt trust." R. F. Conway, F. J. Reed and J. J. McCarthy, are the incorporators. It is said that asphalt beds in South America will pass into control of the new company, which will engage in the importation of raw material. The capitalization is \$100,000.

New York, Jan. 10 .- A special to the Journal and Advertiser from Cam-

bridge, Mass., says: Professors Pickering and Wendell, of the Harvard observatory, have just made some very important discoveries with regard to the new planet Eros. Mosquitos Alone Responsible for

From the recent discoveries it is found that the Harvard observatory took photographs of this planet as early as 1893. These photographs, when comamination at Quemedos as to the pro-pagation of yellow fever germs by the mosquito, has obtained extremely satpared with the ones that were taken last night, made it possible to tell ac-curately the path, size and distance of

the planet from the earth. The astronomers have determined that the planet is probably not more than twenty miles in diameter, and at Dr. Reed says the experiments show beyond a doubt that there is no con-tagion from an infected person or from infected clothing, but that the mos-quitos alone are responsible for the mes comes nearer the earth than any other planet. It belongs to a group of planets that come between Mars and Jupiter, but Eros breaks away and often comes this side of Mars, thus bespread of the disease. In the course of the commission's investigation six nonthe commission's investigation six non-immune persons were infected direct by the bite of a mosquito, which had pre-viously bitten yellow rever patients, and five of these developed infection. CHINESE TROOP : D'1 L'NG.

They Think They Can Defeat Europeans in an Open Fight.

Pekin, Jan. 9 .- A Chlnaman from Sian Fu, where the court is at present, says that within the city \$5,000 Chinese troops are drilling continuously and the majority of them are armed with modern rifles. He says that the feeling of the people there is bitterly anti-foreign, and that they believe that they can meet the allies in the open fight and defeat them. The ministers are considerably aston-

ished over the Chinese grant to Russia of a concession north of the Pel Ho at Tientsin as compared with the British and French concessions combined. The grant, according to the Russians, was made voluntarily for services in en-deavoring to bring about peace. The ministers think that the concession constitutes good pay when considered addition to the annexation of all Man-

Li Hung Chang believes that he will receive a favorable reply regarding the signing of the agreement tomorrow, Senor Corogan, the Spanish minister, thinks that the negotiations will commence at Pekin, possibly ending in Europe. M. De Giers thinks that negotia tions will end at The Hague.


