A Frustrated Search.

Deputy Marshal Fowler and Sheriff Brown, Palmer and Carter, have been sent from Salt Lake City to search the San Joaquin mountains after Kellard and Mikell, the murderers of Sheriff Burns. They were unable to discover the hiding place of the fugitives, but are satisfied they will be captured in due time. Sheriff Burns says, "The reputation of the country is such that if Kellard and Mikell want to stay there they can do so without any danger of being captured, as long as they have friends who will supply them with supplies, as is now the case."

A brother of Mikell is now in that country with a sheep herd. He is speaking of his brother, who was shot in the wrist and leg, and the officers believe that Park City miners are the best to the country yet. The Hogan company is actively at work, and in a very short time the new mining plant will be in operation. A small amount of ore will be sold during the week, and Mr. Tewes is doing all he can to get the main vein which has not yet received. Capt. Hobart, one of the heavy drivers of the Alliance, arrived in the Park Thursday.

From that time on he has been identified with the cause of the Prophet Joseph in Neosho. In 1862 he emigrated to Utah and has resided in Provo since that time, and has been identified with the development of the city from its earliest days to the present period of peace. At the time of his death he was the senior presbyter of the Forty-fifth quorum of Seventies, and died in full faith in the principles of the Gospel.

He has been an invalid for about two years, but was not ill during the four weeks before his death that he was confined to his bed. He died at the home of his son, Giss Holden, where he resided since the death of his wife in 1897.
