

DEATH OF ELMINO DENIO.

Miss Elmira Denio, an estimable young woman of twenty-one years, died at 6 o'clock November 23d at No. 285 south Seventh East street, in the Eleventh ward, at the residence of Joseph N. Edwards, where she was temporarily staying.

The deceased was a native of Michigan although she was a resident of Wisconsin during the greater part of her life. She identified herself with the faith of the Latter-day Saints in that state in 1887. The immediate cause of her death was typhoid pneumonia, with which she was afflicted the last three weeks. Her sufferings were intense but she bore them with patience and fortitude throughout. Her brother, Joseph Denio, of St. Charles, Idaho, was summoned to her bedside by a telegraphic dispatch on Tuesday and remained with her until her spirit passed into the great beyond.

He was in his 26th year of his age, and leaves a loving young wife whom he married a short time previous to his leaving home on his mission. He was always a faithful, dutiful son, true to the call of the servants of God. He leaves a host of friends to mourn his death.

DEATH OF SARAH P. CLARK.

PANGUITON, Utah, Nov. 16, 1893.

I send you, by request, a few lines relating to the life and death of our beloved sister, Sarah P. Clark, and wife of our esteemed president, Jesse W. Crosby Jr.

Sister Crosby was born in Iowa while her parents were en route to Utah, September 20, 1849. She was the daughter of Lorenzo Clark, one of the Mormon Battalion, and Bulah Rogers. She came to Utah with her parents in 1849 and located in Ogden, and thence, through the call of the First Presidency, removed to St. George. On the 4th of October, 1867, in Salt Lake City, she was united for time and eternity in the marriage covenant to Jesse W. Crosby Jr., President Heber C. Kimball performing the ceremony. Her first child, a daughter, was born while her husband was filling a two years' mission to the

Southern states. From St. George they came to Panguitch, January, 1872, where she resided up to the time of her death, which occurred on the 13th inst., making her age 45 years, 1 month and 23 days. She was taken violently ill on Saturday, the 11th inst., about 4 o'clock a.m. and on Monday the 13th inst., at 9:30 a.m. passed quietly and peacefully to rest. She was the mother of ten children, eight of whom survive her. Inflammation of the lungs and heart failure was the cause of her death.

Sister Crosby will be gratefully remembered by many of the Apostles and leading brethren and sisters and others who have so abundantly partaken of her hospitality. She occupied the position of a counselor and also secretary in the Stake organization of the Relief Society.

Today at 10 a.m. funeral services were held. Consoling remarks were made by Elders J. F. Chidester, Jas. Houston, M. M. Steele and Bishop A. Miller. Twenty-three vehicles loaded with people followed the remains to their last resting-place. The dedicatory prayer was offered by Elder A. H. Ridding.

Sister Crosby was a thorough Latter-day Saint, beloved by all who knew her. May she rest in peace till the trump of God shall call the righteous forth; then may she receive her resurrected body and a crown of glory.

DEATH OF JOSEPH JAMES.

OGDEN, Utah, November 24, 1893.

Our ranks are still being thinned out. Elder Joseph James, another of our sturdy veterans, has passed to the spirit world, after a useful, well-spent life. On October 5, 1893, he was taken sick. His disease developed into typhoid pneumonia, and after severe sufferings he succumbed to the fell destroyer on the 19th instant.

The funeral services, which were numerously attended, were held November 20, 1893, at the family residence. The speakers on the occasion were Elders Lorin Farr, George G. Bywater, C. F. Middleton, Thomas Dorey and Bishop Robert McQuarrie. All spoke in high terms of commendation of the life and character of the deceased. The speakers had been acquainted with him for many years, and knew that he was a man of honor, truth and fidelity; ever ready to administer to the needy, to feed the hungry, clothe the naked and visit the sick, and do all that was in his power to relieve their sufferings. His good deeds will live in the memory of hundreds who knew him in life and mourned him in death.

Joseph James was born on the 26th day of February, 1830, at Halse, Somersetshire, England. When about twenty years of age he removed to Cardiff, in South Wales. Shortly after arriving there he met with Elder John Chugg, from whom he first heard the Gospel of Jesus Christ. From that time he began to search the Scriptures. He investigated the principles of Mormonism, and was soon convinced that they were the principles of salvation. On February 13, 1852, he was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He

labored faithfully and diligently in his calling in Wales till February 1, 1854, when he took passage on the ship Gulconda, and sailed for the United States en route for Salt Lake City, which last named place he arrived at September 29, 1854. On October 3 of the same year he was married to Miss Sarah Holyoak, of Birmingham, England. On September 7, 1873, he was ordained a member of the Seventy-sixth quorum of Seventies, and on May 31, 1890, he was ordained a High Priest. All these positions he filled with honor and to the satisfaction of those to whom he was responsible. He leaves a widow, five sons and two daughters. He was the father of thirteen children, ten of whom were sons. He also had thirty-eight grand children.
