It should then be put in the refrigerator until very cold; add sugar and rum, and serve it in the glasses that come for this purpose, or it may be served in half of the peel. Maraschino cheries or sliced strawberries on top will give it the appearance of a very tempting and pretty dish. Grape fuice, if pre-ferred, may be used instead of rum.
