

## Our Country Contemporaries.

Ogden Junction, May 23—

The Ogden Iron Manufacturing Co. maintain that they mean business. Pending necessary alterations and arrangements for the making of iron, they intend to set up their rolling mills and manipulate the metal. Two small furnaces are to be erected at once, work on which has been commenced.

Goodfellow, of Goody's saloon, Fifth Street, has in his possession some splendid specimens of gold-bearing quartz, which have created some sensation in town. Not that this kind of ore is altogether a novelty in Ogden, but his announcement of the discovery of a large vein of the "precious" within sixteen miles of this city is what makes a shaking among the dry bones.

The emigrant train from the east, yesterday afternoon, brought in a man and six children by the name of Gilroy. They had come from Memphis, Tennessee, where the mother of the children died. They came originally from Ohio. Last evening Gilroy was found to be in a dangerous condition, suffering from *delirium tremens*, brought on by drink, to which he had become addicted through the death of his wife. He was taken for safety to the city jail, his children being at the Globe Hotel. While in the jail he imagined that some evil was intended him, and hunting around he found a short piece of stick which had been whittled to a point. With this he made a gash in his throat and then attempted to tear out the windpipe. This effort at suicide was fortunately discovered in time, and a doctor sent for. The city physician being absent, Dr. P. L. Anderson sick and Dr. Murphy away, Mr. E. G. Horrocks promptly attended to the wounded man. He washed and sewed up the wound, and when Dr. Williams arrived, and some sedatives were prescribed, the patient was considerably improved. This morning he is much more rational and in a fair way to recover. Gilroy is a chain smith by trade, and his eldest child, an intelligent girl, says he had no definite motive in leaving Memphis, and has no relatives or acquaintances here. As he is out of funds, his six children form an object for the exercise of benevolence. We will add that the family are Catholics.

The First District Court opened the May term on Monday last, May 21st. The business so far consists of motions and rulings, and orders. Very little business will be done this term. There will be no grand or petit jury until next September term.

On Saturday last, the 18th, a little two year old son of Mr. Myron Fawcett, of Salem, in this county, was playing around the stove in the kitchen. By some unfortunate touch a foot of the stove was pulled out, causing it to tip over. A kettle of boiling water, then on the stove, poured its contents on the little fellow, which scalded him very severely. Every attention is paid to the sufferer, but there is very little hope of his recovery. Mr. and Mrs. Fawcett have the deepest sympathy of the community.

The Utah and Pleasant Valley Railroad Company is fully organized, with M. Packard, President, M. P. Crandall, Superintendent, and George A. Poage, Secretary. The grade is now completed a distance of seven miles and a half, and the remainder of the road to take it to Springville is contracted for, and men busily working at it. The company are determined to push it forward speedily to completion, and thus about 160 men besides teams are engaged daily at it. The company fully purpose to have thirty miles graded, tied, railed and in running order this season, so that the citizens of Utah County can be supplied with coal ere the winter is upon them. Mr. Warren G. Childs, of Ogden, is the chief contractor, who, with the persevering officers, as above stated, will push matters onward with a vim. In connection with the road, a company is organized to work the coal mines, which seem exhaustless, and no time is lost in taking out an immense supply for all our wants. M. P. Crandall is President of this coal company, and M. Packard Superintendent.
