those of the United States that bricklayers and masons in Chicago are paid
very nearly three-times the wages,
plasterers nearly four times, slaters

times, carpenters twice, blacksmiths
twice, bookbinders more than twice,
brickmakers nearly three times,
brass founders and cabinet makers
nearly twice, cigars makers nearly
three times, coopers once and a half
as much, draymen, teamsters and
street railway drivers nearly twice,
horse-shoers three and one-half times,
jewelers more than one and one-half
times, laborers, porters, etc., more
than twice, lithographers three times,
telegraph operators twice and onehalf, sail makers more than twice,
printers twice and a half, saddlers and
harness makers more than the and
one-half times, stevedows more than
twice and tinsmiths once and threefourths the wages paid to similar
trades and callings in London."




