F . 100 . 100 4 . 100 A FREAK WITHOUT FLESH MAN WHOSE WEIGHT HAS DROPPED TO ABOUT FIFTY POUNDS.

Among the freak population that find an abiding place in side-shows and aidseums, examples of extremes in length and also of unusual proportions in lateral growth, have ceased to be rare, but very thin freaks are not so numerous. The attenuated freaks or living skeletons, as they are advertised, are the victims of the generally incurable disease known as progressive muscular atrophy, it is a gradual wasting away of the muscles through a degeneration of the nerve centers governing the processes of nutrition.

The flesh so effectually wastes away that it is a second or second that little is left but the skeleton. very unusual example of this is J. W. Coffey, who is now stopping at the Capital House, He was taken by Dr. Henry Jameson to the Indiana Medical College, where he was examined by the physicians in the presence of the medical students. Although he is 30 years old and five feet eight inches tall he weighs but fifty pounds. When he began wasti g away, at the age of 19, he weighed 165. For rine years he gradually grew thinner, until at present his arms and legs are no larger than those of a threeyear-old child. An exception to his general attenuation are the muscles of his face and neck, which still remain

in a state of normal development, This, the doctors say, is due to the fact that degeneration has not yet at-tacked the nerve centres near the base of the muscles of the face and neck. A remarkable feature about Cof ey's case, the physicians say, is the uniformity with which his flesh has vanished and the soundness of his heart and respiratory organs. Usually the victim is a deformity or his lungs soon become affected, resulting fatally. In this case neither of these features prevails; the atrophy has apparently ceased, and

the indications are for a long lease of Some people grow fat by eating and others grow lean. Coffey is an example of the latter class. He eats regularly three times a day, but, owing to the peculiarity of his affiction, the food is excreted without being assimilated. In appearance this "skeleton dude," as he styles himself, is prepossessing and affable in demeanor. He wishes very much to get married He wishes very much to get married and add to the sum of his physical possession. Altogether he is remarkable for the small space he occupies in the world and the unusual operation of the malady with which he is afflicted—Indianapolis Journal.

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
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
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
