Weekly Crop and Weather Bulletin

United States department of agriculture, Idaho section, climate and crop bulletin of the weather bureau.

Boise, Idaho, Sept. 10 .- During the past week the temperature averaged elow the normal, and light frosts were of frequent occurrence. There was some wind, and more than the usual amount of cloudiness, which prevented what might otherwise have been severe frosts in some sections. Light showers occurred in scattered locali-Light ties throughout the state, and, in parts of Kootenai. Latah and Bannock coun-

ties, precipitation occurred in sufficient amounts to be of benefit to late crops and range. Boise river is reported to be dry for

several miles in Canyon county, as a result of the excessive demands of irrigating canals farther up the stream.

CROPS. Fruit: Apples and pears continue to be marketed in quantities, and late Crawford peaches are maturing; Hun-garian, Italian and silver prunes are be-ing shipped. In the northern counties, the fruit was not so seriously injured as in other sections of the state, by the severe frosts of June, and the fruit crop in that section is reported as being ex-cellent.
